February 11, 2010

- November 7, 2009 was our All Member Meeting at the Olympic Flight Museum in Tumwater. It was a great venue for our meeting. There were about 60 members present in spite of the terrible weather. I do know of several individuals who planned to attend but weren't able to because of flooding issue.
- Sarah Laslett was our first guest speaker. She is a Labor/Educator/Field Organizer for the Evergreen Labor Center. Sarah thanked all of us for our efforts in helping convince the legislature to continue funding the center. She has been involved with labor research and teaching for many, many years. Sarah gave a great presentation on the history of labor and unions. She advised us that she actually goes out to different locations should any of our bargaining units want to hear the presentation and get more information about today's unions and labor.
- Representative Brandon Williams from the 22nd District spoke to us for a few minutes. WPEA endorsed Representative Williams throughout his campaign in 2004. He has worked in all three branches of state government (judicial, executive and legislative) and has been a consistent leader and champion for labor. In fact, he has a perfect voting record in support of labor. He is relentless in his pursuit of fairness in legislation and always stands strong in his convictions. We have always enjoyed working with Representative Williams and were sad to hear that he will not seek another term. He has become very disenfranchised with this legislature.
- Our final speaker was our former Executive Director, Eugene St. John. He has a BA in political science and was great at organizing WPEA and accomplishing much in lobbying the legislature for issues that affected/impacted all of WPEA's bargaining unit members. He has spent over 50 years involved in politics, organizing and fighting for member's rights. Twenty-one of those years were with WPEA. In fact, you can still catch Mr. St. John speaking with legislators on issues/bills he finds important to State employees, and he has always made himself available to us as a sounding board. It was wonderful to see him and his family again!
- Lou Baker, WPEA Contract Administrator, discussed negotiating our last contract and stating that our upcoming negotiations will not include raises because of the state of the economy. As a result, he asked that all members in attendance get together with their fellow bargaining unit members and go through the contract with a "fine tooth comb" and write up contract proposals for language improvement that won't have a fiscal impact. Mr. Baker also advised those in attendance to complete the nomination form in their packets for the next negotiating teams. The teams will be announced at the end of

February. He believes (as do most of us) that negotiations this time are going to be more of a struggle than our last time around.

- Various awards were given out to members who have made a tremendous impact on their bargaining unit members; in lobbying their legislators; being a negotiating team member; and Edmonds CC was given a special award for our contributions to our Silent Auction.
 We ended the evening with the auction and had a great time with that. Half of the funds raised went to the Evergreen Labor Center, and the other half went into our LegPac fund.
- Right now our members are involved in contacting their legislators encouraging them to
 oppose SSB6503 (furlough bill), SB6204 (privatizing liquor stores); support the WMS
 bill to review the numbers of managers that aren't necessary (the legislature should be
 able to find savings here!), as well as numerous other bills. If possible, I would like to be
 directed to other bills that we can help the college in reaching their desired goals with as
 well.
- We are still in the process of reviewing our legislative program and our Executive Board has been tasked with bringing recommendations to our next board meeting.
- There isn't too much going on with grievances right now. WPEA did agree to a request to hire two part-time employees to fill a vacant classified position because of the immediacy of the situation (hiring/funding freeze). This is in no way a precedent-setting decision. It is only a temporary situation that will be reviewed once the freezes are lifted to come back into compliance with our classified contract.

APPROVAL OF NEW CURRICULA

Subject

Board of Trustees first consideration of a blanket approval for upcoming Association of Applied Science – Transfer (AAS-T) degrees based on Associate of Technical Arts degrees already on the college's inventory of professional-technical programs.

Background

Associate in applied science—transfer (AAS-T) degrees are built upon the technical courses required for job preparation but also include a college-level general education component. AAS-T degrees are consistent with the dual purpose of transfer and preparation for direct employment. AAS-T degrees can be developed as brand new primary programs, or they can be based on an Associate of Technical Arts (ATA) degree program already on our college's inventory of professional-technical programs. When AAS-T degrees are formed by adding 20 or more general education credits to one of our existing ATA degrees, the college is not required to submit a full program approval request to the State Board for Community and Technical Colleges (SBCTC) - our request to the SBCTC lists just the title of the new AAS-T program, title of the ATA upon which the new program is based, total number of credits for the new program, and a curriculum guide.

The Business and Health and Human Services divisions have recently been working on developing several new AAS-T degrees based on ATA degrees currently on our program inventory. These new AAS-T Degrees are for transfer to Central Washington University. CWU has launched a new Bachelor's of Applied Science and will accept most ATA degrees as long as 30 credits of general education have been completed. The new AAS-T degrees (comprised of the existing ATA degrees and the 30 credits of general education courses) will make it easier for students to understand which courses are necessary to transfer to Central Washington University.

This new agreement with CWU and the subsequent development of the AAS-T planning sheets will offer new pathways for existing students as their degrees will no longer be terminal. If students complete the AAS-T degree, they automatically transfer to a four-year university and can complete a Bachelor's Degree through CWU online. This 2+2 program will also be of interest to high school students and their parents who want to ensure a four-year degree is a viable option. Since it is expected that numerous professional technical programs will offer AAS-T/CWU Degrees and since no new courses have been added (just the 30 credits of approved general education credits), we are asking for "blanket" approval of these degrees.
